SUMMARY OF 2025 TRAIL WORK ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- 439 logs moved off trails
- 2,858 branches growing across trails removed
- 2,157 young plants growing within trail corridors removed
- 7,398 feet (1.4 miles) of trail tread restored and/or constructed

The work above enabled 18 miles of local trails to be enjoyed free of obstructions!
